### 2023/2024 City Council Goals

1

### Become the Most Connected Community in the U.S.

Phase III: Broadband to the Home Project

Status: The Master Network Agreement with altafiber for the Fiber to the Home Project has been fully executed. A working team including members of altafiber and City staff began planning the timeline, next steps, and staffing plan for the implementation phase of the project. Since the announcement of this agreement, more than 665 residents have signed up for project notifications from altafiber.

2

### Realize the Metro Center Revitalization Vision

Reposition the Metro Center legacy office park by implementing the vision and goals of the Dublin Corporate Area Plan. Develop a design and implementation framework that creates a distinctive identity, encourages dynamic reinvestment, provides a vibrant mix of uses in a walkable environment, and promotes sustainable design principles. Identify opportunities for public and private partnerships for catalytic projects that transform the Metro Center area consistent with the framework.

Status: Staff members have drafted a request for proposal (RFP) to solicit a proposed scope for a design firm to develop the design and implementation framework for the Metro Center/DCAP area. Staff will advertise the RFP in early August and have a firm under contract to begin work in the fall. Staff continue to work with the property owners along the Frantz Road frontage to develop a concept to present to the Planning & Zoning Commission. These efforts, in part, will be tied to the Community Plan Update currently underway.

### Strengthen the Stewardship and Vitality of our Historic District Core

Explore dedicated day-to-day management and establish definitive goals on "what" the Dublin community aims to preserve — environment, structures, era and architecture. Explore dedicated management and support options and structure that would allow "someone" to wake up every day with the focused mission and tools of delivering on the goals of the district.

Status: Staff shared City Council's direction regarding the proposed modifications to the demolition standards within the Historic District Code and Guidelines at a neighborhood meeting in May. Residents did not raise concerns about the proposed modifications but shared feedback about the application of the remaining sections of the code and guidelines. Staff members, with consultant support, plan to conduct a series of meetings over the summer to provide additional clarification about the code and guidelines and the overall review process to gain a clearer understanding of the topics raised by the residents prior to moving ahead with modifications to the demolition language. City divisions have worked with the Dublin Community Improvement Corporation to reinstate the Commercial Façade Improvement Program. The Commercial Façade Improvement webpage is live on the Economic Development website. The City, Dublin Chamber and the Historic Dublin Business Association are actively promoting the program to their contacts. One of the City's Economic Development administrators will focus efforts on downtown and serve as the primary City resource and liaison with the Historic District.

### Develop Dublin's "Destination of Choice" Next-Generation Community Events Vision.

Develop a local and regional community events program and management roadmap. Leverage Dublin parks and facilities to create a connected, comprehensive, and fiscally sustainable vision that drives vitality, engagement, and entertainment.

Status: Over the past year, the City has conducted numerous efforts in advance of this goal. In advancement of Goal #4, staff members have evaluated the City's current event tempo, operating and funding model; researched and analyzed operating models used by cities both domestically and internationally; visited cities both domestically and internationally to experience different events and discuss funding and management models used by other cities with their staffs; and brought forward new events and policies regarding next-generation community events for Council's consideration.

Based on Council's refinement of this goal in May, staff members are working to draft an RFP and researching potential firms to provide insight on new funding and operating models as well as innovative revenue-generating and cost-saving measures for signature events. It's anticipated that an RFP will be developed and advertised in August.

Additionally, in an effort to streamline the process for permitted events, Council approved by motion an updated Park Use Policy for South Coffman Park and Riverside Crossing Park. This policy will help leverage Dublin's parks and facilities to connect the community through permitted community events. The policy will also allow for fee-based activities to occur in the parks, removing prior restrictions on such events. The Communications & Public Information team began marketing the updates in July.

Dublin Community Recreation Center Refresh	In 2022, Council directed \$3.1 million of ARPA funds for improvements to the Dublin Community Recreation Center (DCRC). Subsequently, staff members began working to identify an architect to update the improvement scenarios identified pre-pandemic, a task which was complicated by the high growth of inflation, especially in the construction industry. In July 2022, the City contracted with MSA Design to update the necessary improvements and associated costs for the DCRC.	Staff members are working to finalize plans to replace the indoor track flooring and add more equipment to the fitness floor during the annual shutdown of the Dublin Community Recreation Center. The center will be shut down from Aug. 26 to Sept. 4. The indoor track replacement will likely require the closure of the track prior to the shutdown. Complete details will be publicly communicated once they are finalized.  The digital signage project is scheduled to be completed by the end of the shutdown. Patrons will be able to view schedules and program promotions on the new digital assets when the DCRC reopens Sept. 5. ### **Business Retention & Expansion**

- Business Retention and Expansion (BRE) visits
  were on target for the month and are trending
  toward hitting our annual goal. Economic
  Development interns have been conducting field
  research on office vacancies in the City's business
  districts beginning with the Blazer Research
  District.
- In partnership with the Dublin Chamber of Commerce, Economic Development is hosting the annual Business Appreciation Event Aug. 3 at Fado to kick off the Dublin Irish Festival.

### **Innovation & Entrepreneurship**

- Economic Development has partnered with Information Technology, and the internal PIEworks group to evaluate the Dublink program and tiers of participation available to interested parties. In prior months, several technology services providers and data centers in and around Dublin have approached Economic Development about partnering with the City in a fashion similar to Expedient and Dartpoints. Staff members are currently evaluating the request within the context of current Dublink policies and goals to ensure that the program is efficiently and effectively contributing to Council's goal to be the most connected city.
- Development staff members, in collaboration with the Intelligent Community Forum (ICF), are organizing a Dublin Institute for the Study of the Intelligent Community fall workshop. The purpose of this event is to relaunch the institute post-pandemic by convening various cities, industry partners and interested public organizations throughout Ohio that are interested in broadband expansion and smart cities initiatives. The event will serve as an opportunity for communities to hear about the operations of benchmark ICF communities in Ohio, while strengthening Dublin's relationships and standing with its peer communities.

### **Strategic Initiatives**

 Economic Development is drafting an implementation strategy to integrate the goals and actions from the findings in the TEConomy and Newmark reports. This workplan will illustrate the tactics and measures to be used by the Economic Development team in daily activities. Staff continue to work with Newmark and TEConomy to finalize and present the strategies to City Council for adoption in September.

### **Workforce Development**

- Development staff met with Mark Flesch of Gordon Flesch and Greg Guy of Air Force
   One. Both individuals expressed interest in an increased partnership with Tolles and Dublin City Schools. Economic Development has connected these individuals to the City's education partners.
   Tolles will be exploring the applicability of housing an HVAC program at its location and partnering with Air Force One to place high school interns.

### Compliance & Enforcement

### **Zoning & Code Compliance**

### **Areas of Focus**

Toy Barn Sites: 5002, 5100 and 5200 Post Road Code violation letters were sent June 16 following voluntary efforts for compliance. These violations include deficient landscape materials (14 trees and several shrub hedges), rusted light pole, and missing stucco on the façade of 5200 Post Road.

Muirfield Greenway Corridor — Indian Run Meadows
Zoning and Code Enforcement, in coordination with
Parks and Recreation, are gaining compliance of
deficient trees and continued maintenance of the
required buffer along Muirfield Drive. Ten of the 31
residential properties that are required to maintain
this buffer did not participate in the Muirfield
Greenway Corridor Program. Letters were sent to
these property owners with information about this
program as well as expectations for maintenance of
this space. Three of these properties were sent letters
for removal and replacement of diseased trees.

### **Routine Landscape Inspections**

Forty-two follow-up inspections of voluntary compliance letters sent in late winter were conducted in the month of June. The majority of these inspections are located inside I-270 and along Emerald Parkway, south of Shier Rings Road. Nineteen of these inspections complied voluntarily. The remaining 23 have been sent a second letter with compliance required by Oct. 15. The 19 sites that have complied have replaced 124 trees and 63

### **Code Enforcement**

Typically, May and June are the busiest months of the year for Code Enforcement, with a large spike in grass and weeds cases, as well as premise condition cases. This 60-day period historically has between 250 and 275 cases opened overall, with more than 50% in these two categories alone. Grass and weeds complaints in May and June have averaged approximately 100 cases annually for the last three years. 2023 saw an increase in premise condition cases to 55 due to targeted area inspections by Code Enforcement officers.

Short Term Rental registrations are currently at eight properties in 2023, up from five registered properties in 2022. There are currently four additional properties that are under investigation, which either ends in a new registration or the rental listing is voluntarily pulled by the property owner. Three new properties have been registered through this enforcement procedure.

While the team generates new cases from field observations, members also receive case inquiries from residents through the GoDublin app, in addition to calls and emails sent directly to staff. GoDublin requests automatically start a case within the Accela system and allow the resident to track the progress of the complaint. If contact info is provided, Code Enforcement staff correspond directly with the resident regarding the case, especially if additional information is needed.

New this year is a Code Enforcement door hanger that was created in conjunction with Communications & Public Information to address common issues. The door hanger complements GoDublin's service request categories. This format has allowed Code Enforcement officers to start an immediate line of communication with a resident or property owner in the event they are unavailable while officers are investigating a complaint or addressing a field observation. Although a follow-up letter is sent, officers have garnered a quicker response: either through a call back or by the issue being abated within 24 hours. ### Commercial & Residential Plan Review

Total plan review numbers decreased in July. Numbers decreased by 23% compared with May. June had the highest number of plan reviews so far in 2023. Overall plan review numbers are expected to increase through summer. The division has been averaging 110 plan reviews per month.

### **Plan Review Turn-Around Times**

Staff members are consistently at about a 10-day turn-around time for commercial plans; July's average was 10.82 days. Residential reviews were at a 6.90 day turn-around in July. These surpass the division's 14-day target.

### **New Building Permits Issue**

Building permits issued (that required plan review) decreased this month, compared to May numbers. Numbers can regularly fluctuate approximately 10% each month. Permit numbers are down 30% over May's numbers, with May being the highest number of permits issued so far this year. The monthly average, over the last 12-month period, is approximately 45 new building permits (that required plan review) issued per month.

### **Total Square Footage of Building Permits**

This number can vary considerably when a comprehensive project is issued. September, October and February were strong months with a total of approximately 795,000 square feet. Square footage in July was strong at 182,087 square feet. The monthly average during the past 12 months is approximately 150,000 square feet per month.

### Inspections

June numbers are steady, and remain strong, with an increase of 12% from May's numbers. This month, staff members completed 619 building inspections. June numbers for this year are within 9% of last June's corresponding numbers.

Two serious injury suspected crashes were reported in May on I-270 at U.S. 33, one northbound and one southbound. Both were the result of drivers not maintaining an assured clear distance ahead. The suspected sever crash ratio in May was 2.8%, while the same ratio for YTD is 1.97%.

#### **Forestry**

 Street tree fertilization is ongoing throughout the city to address nutrient deficiencies. To date, 464 trees have been fertilized.

#### Horticulture

- Summer maintenance is ongoing within the parks.
   Bike path trimming is a focus, along with weed control and mulching.
- Staff members are beginning to plan for fall plantings.

#### Sustainability

- Styrofoam Collection Boxes: 1.73 tons of Styrofoam has been recycled so far in 2023
- GoZero Composting: 23.73 tons of compost has been diverted from the landfill since Jan. 1
- Thus far in 2023, more than 3,500 gallons of gas has been saved by 424 unique drivers across the City's 21 EV charging stations.
- Dublin secured an Event Waste Reduction Grant for the Dublin Irish Festival to cover the cost of feather flags, which will help patrons locate the water refill stations. Water refill stations will be located at three points throughout Festival grounds to provide clean and safe drinking water to attendees and help to reduce the number of plastic water bottles entering the waste stream.



Twenty high school students participated in Citizen U Jumpstart, the high school version of Citizen University. These young residents spent a week learning about Dublin's form of government, history and operations as well as meeting with professionals in City departments and divisions. At the conclusion of the week, Jumpstart participants co-wrote a thank-you to staff, saying, "Thank you again for taking the time and making the effort to share the intricacies of how the City operates each and every day. Dublin would not be what is without your service, and we thank you for everything you do for our beloved community." Students plan to continue their involvement with the City in numerous ways.

### **Independence Day Celebration Support**

A total of 134 volunteers offered their time on Independence Day, serving 500 hours in 18 various roles throughout the day.

#### JASCO Grassroots Summit

Host family recruitment continues for Japanese visitors who are visiting Dublin from Sept. 21 to 24 as part of the JASCO Grassroots Summit. The City has helped secured five Dublin host families.

#### **Teen Buddies**

Since its founding during the COVID-19 pandemic, more than 130 people have participated in the Teen Buddy Program, a one-on-one matching program of Dublin teens with older adults. In partnership with Forever Dublin, the volunteer program focuses on direct outreach, technology learning and ongoing connections. In July, the program concluded and will be revamped by Dublin teens and older adults this fall.

### **Independence Day**

- The 2023 Independence Day Parade and Evening Celebration brought the community together for a day full of festivities. Kathy Harter served as the Grand Marshal, presiding over the day's events.
- 72 units participated in the Independence Day Parade
- There was a 12% increase in table and wristband sales over 2022 for the Evening Celebration. The crowd enjoyed performances from Ann Wilson & Tripsitter, The Floorwalkers and North to Nashville.

#### **Permitted Events**

- The annual Arthritis Foundation Car Show occurred at Metro Center on July 21-22. The event typically brings more than 2,000 visitors to Dublin and generates 85 overnight stays at Dublin hotels/motels.
- The Nationwide Children's Hospital Columbus Duck Race was held in Riverside Crossing Park on July 22.
   This event brings approximately 1,000 visitors to Dublin for the day.
- The Buckeye Classic archery tournament was held at Darree Fields from July 27 to 30. This event has an estimated attendance of 1,000 people and generates nearly 400 overnight stays at Dublin hotels/motels.
- Over the past month, Community Events received five new community event permit applications for the fall.
- There were 10 permitted events in July. All were tier 2 events.



#### **Dublin Irish Festival**

- The new ticket price structure has led to a 300% increase in one-day ticket sales over this time last year. The final ticket price increase occurred July 23. Residents will continue to receive a discount on tickets sold at the Dublin Community Recreation Center through Aug. 3.
- New this year, the Festival will be piloting a selfserve beverage tent near the Dublin Stage. This is something being implemented at stadiums and arenas nationwide.
- The VIP clubs are nearly sold out.
- The Dublin Connector will operate special hours during the Dublin Irish Festival. Residents over 55 years old and people with disabilities can call 1.833.742.7333 to schedule a ride to and from the Festival. One caregiver may join a rider and must be included in the reservation. The Dublin Connector will drop off and pick up riders at the main entrance of the Dublin Community Recreation Center, near the flagpole and Abbey Theater.
- 4-8 p.m. Friday, Aug. 4
- 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 5
- 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Sunday, Aug. 6
- Bird scooters will also be available to provide alternative transportation options to and from the Festival.
- A consultant has been hired to conduct an Economic Impact Study for the 2023 Dublin Irish Festival. The previous study was performed in 2018 and indicated the Festival had an economic impact of \$8.5 million on the local economy.
- A separate consultant has been hired to provide recommendations to improve the accessibility of the event for older adults and people with disabilities.
- Guests will be surveyed Sunday morning to determine the impact of the services on attendance and revenue for the Festival.
- Staff members have expanded the capacity of the high-end whiskey tastings onsite and expect to sell out before the Festival opens.

## Legislative

### **Update**

### **Political & Budget Updates**

#### House Bill 33 — Operating Budget (June 30th deadline)

- House Bill 33 was signed into law by Governor DeWine on July 4.
- Budget highlights:
  - Taxes
    - Exempts the income of individuals under 18 from municipal income taxation.
    - Removed the tax exemption for stock options and deferred comp.
    - Adds House Bill 121, which allows businesses with remote employees to use a modified municipal income tax apportionment formula for net profits for taxable years beginning in 2022.
    - Creates personal income tax cuts that will be phased in over two years, leaving Ohio with two brackets.
    - 3.50% income over \$100,000
    - 2.75% income under \$100.000
  - Local Government Fund
    - Permanently increases the percentage of state tax revenue that the Local Government Fund (LGF) and Public Library Fund receive per month from 1.66% to 1.70%
    - Increases the minimum amount that may be distributed from the LGF to each county to \$850,000, beginning in FY24
    - Requires the county budget commission that adopts an alternative distribution formula for the county undivided local government fund to hold a hearing on the formula every five years
  - Broadband
    - Adds the Broadband Pole Replacement Program, which reimburses qualifying broadband service providers for utility pole replacements, mid-span pole installations, and undergrounding that support broadband infrastructure.
    - Excludes grants or forgiven debt for providing/ expanding broadband services in Ohio from the Commercial Activity Tax (CAT).
    - Makes changes to the Residential Broadband Expansion Grant Program by requiring applications to be prioritized from the highest to lowest point score according to the rubric; under the rubric, the maximum score for an application is 1,000 points
    - There were no provisions that would be viewed as problematic language that would negatively impact public broadband

- Tobacco and Nicotine
  - Vetoed by Governor DeWine, this provision would have prohibited any fees or taxes on tobacco/ nicotine products other than those expressly authorized by state law
- Miscellaneous
  - Next Generation 911 was included in the final version of the budget, but the user fee was reduced to 40 cents (from the House's 64 cents) for wireless and VOIP devices
    - In October 2025, the user fee will be reevaluated based on the need of funding to continue the program
    - There is a \$200 monthly cap on facilities that have many phone lines (i.e., large companies, hotels, etc.)
  - Law Enforcement Training (CPT funds) was funded at \$80 million over the biennium

### **Operating Budget Timeline**

- April 26 The House voted the budget out 78-19
- June 15 The Senate voted the budget out 24-7
- June 21 The House refused to concur on the Senate's amendments, sending the bill to Conference Committee where key House and Senate members continued negotiations until an agreement was reached
- June 3 Conference Committee reached an agreement, sending the bill back to the House and Senate floor for a final vote; the House voted 67-30 and the Senate voted 25-6
- June 30 The constitutional deadline for when a balanced budget bill must be on the Governor's desk, ready to sign
- July 4 Governor DeWine signed the budget into law and vetoed 44 items




