Eiterman Road Culvert over South Fork Indian Run



- Franklin County Engineer's Office project in coordination with Dublin
- Replace culvert under Eiterman Road near Nestle due to structural conditions
- Completion: Spring 2026

Waterways Maintenance Program 2025



- Maintenance of waterways, open channels and streams located within city limits
- Addresses areas of erosion and provides for bank stabilization in parcels for which the city is responsible
- Completion: May 2026

Earlington Park Drainage Basin Improvements



- Raises embankment on north end of basin to increase storage volume
- Re-grades around basin
- Increases storm pipe from 24 inches to 36 inches
- Reconstructs pedestrian trail
- Improvements will increase safety by decreasing how often the Brand Road pedestrian tunnel floods
- Completion: May 2026

Park Place Stormwater Basin Improvements



- Provides basin edge treatment to address areas of erosion
- Re-establishes the aquatic bench along the perimeter
- Improves aesthetic
- Completion: July 2026

Pedestrian Tunnel Maintenance 2025

CZPA – What is it?

Certificate of Zoning Plan Approval Required for:

- Patios at grade
- Pergolas
- Fences
- Sheds/accessory structures less than 200 square feet
- Driveway expansion/change in materials



CZPA – What is it NOT?

Building Permit Required for:

- Attached building/accessory structures
- Detached accessory structures more than 200 square feet
- Swimming pools/barriers
- Decks
- Interior remodels/renovations



CZPA – Why?

- ✓ Ensure use is permitted
- ✓ Ensure setbacks/other criteria are met
- ✓ Ensure easements/open space areas are preserved
- ✓ Benefits:
 - Avoid title issues
 - Neighborhood harmony
 - Save time/money

Approval from your HOA

- City does not enforce HOA rules

Building permit

- Still needs to be obtained, if required

Crime and Traffic Trends

Year to date for 2026, Dublin Police officers have seen

- **Decrease** in overall theft offenses (-8)
- **Decrease** in theft from vehicles (-6)
- **Decrease** in breaking and entering offenses (-1)
- **Increase** in motor vehicle thefts & attempted theft (+3)
- **Increase** in burglary offenses (+3)
- **Increase** in overall traffic crash reports (+3) and serious injuries (+4)
- **Increase** in OVI-related crashes (+4)
 - Officers have made 1,900 traffic stops

Crime Events

- On March 6, Dublin Police investigated arson and vandalism incidents at two different homes under construction on Drummore Court. The following day, we identified a suspect who was charged with arson.
- On Feb. 15 and 16, officers responded to several thefts from and vandalism to vehicles. On March 10, the Community Impact Unit and Columbus Police executed a search warrant in Columbus, resulting in the recovery of stolen property, including firearms. Two teenage suspects were arrested.
- On March 6, officers responded to a theft at 6611 Liggett Rd. Utilizing the Drone as First Responder, we identified and arrested two suspects for attempting to steal a trailer from that location.
- On March 8, officers investigated an assault involving a firearm at 6. S. High Street. We identified a suspect using evidence gathered from Flock and Meraki cameras. On March 10, Detective Craft coordinated with Grove City Police to locate and charge the teenage suspect.



Community Noise

How loud is too loud?



Public Nuisance Noise
Sound levels may not exceed 80 decibels for more than 15 minutes, measured at 50 feet.

Vehicle Engine/Exhaust Noise
For posted speed limits of 35 mph and lower, the threshold is 86 decibels; 90 for higher-speed roads.



What's Changing as a Result?

Clear, measurable limits have now been set for the most frequent noise complaints:

- **Vehicle engine/exhaust noise:** For posted speed limits of 35 mph and lower, the threshold is 86 decibels; 90 for higher-speed roads.
- **Engine braking:** Prohibited within city limits.
- **Vehicle sound systems:** Speakers and stereos must stay below 80 decibels.
- **Public nuisance noise:** Sound levels may not exceed 80 decibels for more than 15 minutes, measured at 50 feet.
- **Ongoing/overt disturbances:** Repetitive or persistent noise may still be considered a violation, even at lower volumes.

Noise Enforcement



How Will Enforcement Work?

The updated ordinance gives Dublin Police clearer guidelines and tools to address noise concerns. The goal is not punishment — it's preserving peace and comfort in our neighborhoods. Enforcement will focus on:

- **Education First**— officers start with a conversation and request voluntary compliance
- **Warnings for Repeat Issues**— officers may issue a warning or document the incident if the problem continues
- **Citations for Ongoing or Overt Violations**— used when disturbances are significant or persistent

Micromobility Updates

Dublin has updated its rules for micromobility and other active transportation devices based on years of real-world experience and community input. The changes promote safer, clearer use of streets, sidewalks and shared use paths—supporting a more connected Dublin today and into the future.

E-Bike Classifications (No Changes to Code Sections 70.01 & 75.10)

Understanding permitted use, speed, and sidewalk access

Class 1



- **Assist Type:** Pedal-assist
- **Motor:** ≤ 750 watts
- **Max Speed:** **20 mph**
- **Sidewalks / SUP:**
 **Allowed**

Class 2



- **Assist Type:** Pedal-assist + Throttle
- **Motor:** ≤ 750 watts
- **Max Speed:** **20 mph**
- **Sidewalks / SUP:**
 **Allowed**

Class 3



- **Assist Type:** Pedal-assist (throttle varies*)
- **Motor:** ≤ 750 watts
- **Max Speed:** **28 mph**
- **Sidewalks / SUP:**
 **Prohibited**

Key Distinction: Class 3 e-bikes operate at higher speeds and are **not permitted** on **sidewalks** or shared use paths, unlike Class 1 and 2.

Permitted Micromobility Devices



Electric Mobility Devices

Standing and seated e-scooters, e-skateboards and class 1 and 2 e-bikes are permitted on sidewalks, shared use paths and roads with a speed limit of 25 mph or lower, provided they follow safety regulations.

Non-Motorized Devices

Bicycles, skateboards and non-motorized scooters are permitted, provided they follow safety regulations.

Mini-Motorcycles Expressly Prohibited

Banned Vehicles

Mini-motorcycles, both gas and electric, are prohibited on public paths, sidewalks, roadways and parks

Safety Enhancement

The regulation aims to increase safety for pedestrians and park visitors by restricting potentially hazardous vehicles



Additional Code Provisions



Parental Responsibility

Parents/guardians may not knowingly permit a child to violate the provisions in this chapter

Why it matters:

Encourages parents to choose devices appropriate for their child's age and ability

Promotes youth safety



Helmet Law

Requires helmet use for operators under age 16

Why it matters:

Aligns with Ohio's low-speed micromobility law

Consistent with minimum age to drive a motor vehicle



Enforcement

First offenses are minor misdemeanors; penalties escalate for repeat offenses

Law enforcement may impound vehicles operated in violation

Beautify Your Neighborhood Grant

Established in 2011 to provide **funding assistance and professional support to City of Dublin Homeowners Associations and Civic Associations**

Enhancing the neighborhood with **high-quality, sustainable beautification projects** that benefit and enhance the Dublin community

Eligible Projects

- Within City of Dublin
- Maintained by Association
- Completed in one year
- New and rehab projects
- Sensitive and sustainable

Examples:

- Entry feature enhancement
- Updated landscape beds
- New stone walls, fencing, benches



Grant Funding

- Grant funds included in the **City's annual operating budget**
- Total grant budget **\$32,000**
- Funding **available annually** and distributed on a competitive basis to Associations
- Individual grants awards **\$500-\$5,000**
- Grant requires an **equal match from Association**
- Individual associations are limited to **1 grant award every 3 years**
- City will reimburse Association with grant amount upon successful completion of the project

(First Friday of **December**)
- Application Form
(Last Friday of **January**)
- Community Development Committee Recommendation
- **City Council Approval**
- Completion of the Project
- **Reimbursement of Grant Amount**

Fall Cycle

- Pre-submittal Meeting
- Pre-application Form
(Last Friday of **May**)
- Application Form
(Last Friday of **June**)
- Community Development Committee Recommendation
- **City Council Approval**
- Completion of the Project
- **Reimbursement of Grant Amount**

What You'll Need

- **Applicant Information** (*Name, position, address, telephone, email*)
- **Project Information** (*Association name, site address/parcel number, project description, answer preliminary questions*)
- **Funding Information** (*Estimated total project cost, amount of funds requested, association 100% match and additional amount above 100% of grant request*)
- **Financial Details** (*Contractor quote, detailed project budget, copy of the association budget, bank statements etc.*)
- **Plans, Drawings, Documents** (*Drawings, plans and supporting documents*)

Selection Criteria

- During a **non-competitive application cycle**, approximately six spring applications can proceed, depending on individual grant request amounts and the total combined funding
- If **more than six application** are received, selection criteria is based on points system and top applications move forward (spring cycle)
- Remaining funds are used for Fall cycle
