Re: Nomination of First Lieutenant George L. Seeds, U.S. Army Air Forces to be Added

to the Killed in Action Memorial at Dublin Cemetery

Background

First Lieutenant George L. Seeds was killed in action (KIA) piloting an aircraft over France on Christmas Day 1944. His remains are buried in section 1A of the Dublin Cemetery next to those of his brother, U.S. Army Technical Sergeant Robert C. Seeds. Robert, an infantryman, was killed in action near Florence, Italy just months prior, on September 12, 1944.

Prior to the construction of the City's KIA Memorial in 2013, the National Information Company (NICOM), a research firm specializing in military records, was engaged to identify names of persons from Dublin or Washington Township who may qualify for inclusion on the wall. Sixteen names were initially identified as "confirmed" and inscribed on the wall, including Robert C. Seeds whom NICOM identified as a Washington Township resident. Robert's brother, George L. Seeds was included on this list as "probable," but his name was not included on the Memorial. All documentation researched by staff to date indicates a consistent affiliation to Dublin/Washington Township for both brothers.

Janet Seeds, the brothers' surviving niece, brought the disparity to staff's attention in June of this year. In accordance with Section IV of the adopted Inclusion Policy for KIA Recognition, Ms. Seeds and her family requested the name of George L. Seeds be added to the KIA Memorial.

Recommendation

Based on City Council's approval of Robert Seeds name to be included on the Memorial in 2013; the eligibility criteria of both brothers is consistent; and the remains of both are buried in the Dublin Cemetery, staff recommends George L. Seeds be added to the KIA Memorial in accordance with Section IV of the Inclusion Policy for KIA Recognition (attached). Robert's name is currently on the memorial but George's name was omitted.







He was a junior in engineering when he entered the Army Air Forces. Also lost in the Fortress with Lt. Stoneburner was his friend and former college companion, Lt. John Griffin, Jr., of Columbus.

STRUBLE, Pfc. John E., 22, Agr w'44, son of Mr. and Mrs. M. H. Struble of Toledo. A medical paratrooper, he was killed in action in Holland on Sept. 22, '44. He previously had been reported missing in action but later was reunited with his own outfit when the allies captured the city of Rennes, France. He was a junior at Ohio State when he entered the Army in Nov. '42.

TROENDLY, Pvt. Donald P., 30, BSc Agr '39, husband of Mrs. Evelyn Troendly of Utica, O. He was killed in action in France on Sept. 11, '44. A native of Coshocton county, he had taught vocational agriculture at Utica four years before entering the Army. In addition to his widow, he is survived by two children, his mother and four sisters. Captain Stafford is reported to have lost one leg in a bomb explosion at Biak. His wife is Mrs. Virginia Stafford, also

an Ohio State graduate, the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Homer C. Hockett. Dr. Hockett is professor emeritus of history at Ohio State.

It was a great occasion for Mr. and Mrs. Howard E. Stroupe, Sr., of Columbus, when a transport plane landed in Columbus bringing 22 wounded men from the European war zone. Among them was Lt. While serving with the infantry in France, he was reported missing in action on Nov. 23, '44; later was reported killed on that date. He had been overseas only one month when his death was reported. He entered the Army in February, '43; was assigned to an ASTP unit at Monroe, La., before taking additional training and embarking for active duty. A brother, also serving in the Army, survives.

REINICKER, 2d Lt. Donald Arthur, 25, Com w'42, husband of the former Jean Elizabeth Greenslade (BSc Edu '41) of Bellevue, and son of Mr. and Mrs. Norman G. Reinicker of Allentown, Pa. Reconnaissance officer for an artillery battalion, he was seriously wounded by a German shell near Lanuvio, Italy, on June 2, '44, and died the following day. His battalion had landed on Anzio Beach during the first week of that invasion. He was a varsity swimmer at Ohio State. In addition to his widow and parents, he is survived by an infant son, James Douglas, whom his father never saw. Lt. Reinicker is buried at Nettuno, Italy. (See cut.)

SATULLO, Pvt. Joseph A., 22, Arts w'46, husband of Mrs. Magdalene Satullo and son of Mr. and Mrs. Nicolo Satullo, all of Cleveland. He was reported killed in action in Germany on Nov. 20, '44. He was a member of the Ohio National Guard, was commissioned at Indiantown Gap, Pa., in March, '42, and had been overseas since Sept. '44. An infant daughter, whom he never saw, and two brothers also survive. On campus he was a member of Theta Xi fraternity.

SEEDS, Lt. George L., 20, Engr av'46, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence G. Seeds of Hilliard, O. He lost his life in aerial action over France on Dec. 25, '44. His older brother, T/Sgt. Robert C., BSc Agr '38, previously had been reported killed with the infantry in Italy on Sept. 12, '44. It was the first "Ohio State family" to lose two sons in World War II. SOUTHWORTH, Maj. Billy Brooks, 27, Com w'41, son of Billy II. Southworth of Sunbury, O. A veteran of more than four years in the AAF with 25 bombing missions over Europe to his credit, Major Southworth was killed when the B-29 Superfort he was piloting crashed in Flushing Bay, N. Y., on Feb. 16, '45. His plane, enroute to Florida from Mitchell Field, N. Y., overshot LaGuardia Field in an attempted emergency landing. He was the first player in organized baseball to enlist in the Service in this war, entering the AAF on Dec. 20, '40. He was one of the first to fly a B-17 with the 8th AAF in England, piloted bomb-ers named "The Winning Run" and "The Bad Check." He attended the University three years, was last on campus for the '44 Homecoming game against Michigan. (see cut.) Billy Southworth, Sr., is manager of the St. Louis Cardinals.

THIEMAN, Pvt. William, 22, Engrav'46, only son of Mr. and Mrs. William

Thieman of Minster, O. Member of the 2d Infantry Division, he died of wounds received in action against the Nazis in Belgium on Dec. 14, '44. He had participated in the capture of Brest and the battle for Aachen and had been awarded the Combat Infantry badge. He was an honor student in high school and was a sophomore at the University when he entered the Army in May '43.

VANA, Lt. Clarence R., 23, Engr w'44, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Vana of Cleveland. Serving as navigator on a bomber, he was reported missing in ac-tion over Austria on June 26, '44, and several months later was reported killed on that date. He was a graduate of Maple Heights High school and after attending the University was employed by the General Electric Co. Two sisters and a brother also survive.

WALTON, Pfc. Robert W., Arts w'46, only son of Capt. and Mrs. Raymond W. Walton formerly of Columbus, now of Hot Springs, Ark. While serving with the 7th Army, he was killed in action near Strasbourg, France, on Nov. 20, '44. He had been overseas since the previous September. At Ohio State he was pledged to Beta Theta Pi fraternity. One sister also survives

WARING, Sgt. John I., 23, Agr w'44, only son of Mr. and Mrs. James H. Waring of Cleveland. A veteran of two years' service with the Air Transport Command, stationed in India most of that time, he was killed in a plane crash near Chattanooga, Tenn., on Jan. 16, '45. He had returned to the states in Sept. '44 and was assigned to Romulus Field, Mich. Besides his parents, he is survived by two sisters.

WATT, Lt. Charles Kenneth, 23, Agr w'+1, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Watt of Jacobsburg, O. Veteran of more than 50 combat missions as navigator on a B-17 bomber in north Africa and Italy, he was transferred to a Transport Squadron in the summer of '44 and lost his life while making his second Atlantic crossing on Nov. 1, '44. He wore the DFC and the Air Medal with nine Clusters. He won the DFC on a mission over Tunis in which he saved the life of his bombardier at the risk of his own. His widow also survives. (See cut.)

WIRTZ, Lt. (jg) James R., 22, BA'43, only son of Mr. and Mrs. Russell L. Wirtz of Columbus. While serving with the crew of an LCI, he was killed in action in the south Pacific in early January, '45. 408 GOLD STARS Triple World War I

The University's honor roll of dead in World War II mounted to a total of 408 last month — more than three times the total of Ohio Staters (135) who gave their lives in the first World War.

For the second consecutive month, additional deaths of sons of the University were reported at the rate of more than one a day. It was the second darkest month for the University and the Alumni Association as a total of 33 new war dead were reported to the War Records Division.

Among the new dead was Lt. Vernon L. Zieske, 25, BSc Com'41, pilot of a P-47 Thunderbolt, killed in action over Belgium. His brother, Lt. Clarence E. (Bud) Zieske, also a University graduate, gave his life in aerial combat last August. The Zieske family, of Geneva, O., was the third University family to lose two sons in combat. (See cuts of the two late Seeds brothers, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence G. Seeds.—Ed.)

Jim Dennis Killed. Another especially hard blow was the death of Lt. James W. (Jim) Dennis, 28, BSc Com '37, of Ashley, O., killed in the crash of a bomber in Alabama. He was one of the most handsome, popular young men to graduate from the University in recent years.

Of the 33 new war dead, 23 gave their lives in action, nine were killed in plane crashes, and one died of a cerebral hemorrhage. Fourteen gave their lives in ground fighting in Germany, France

and Belgium. Three were killed in Italy.
The University and the Alumni Association last month extended deepest sympathy to the relatives of these new honored dead:

ABRAHAMS, Lt. Sardou, 25, Com w'41, husband of Mrs. Betty Abrahams and son of Mr. and Mrs. Sol Abrahams, all of Cleveland Heights. A pilot of the Air Transport Command, he was killed when his plane exploded as he was landing at an air base in China on Jan. 25, '45. He had been overseas since the preceding October, was employed by an insurance company before entering the AAF. An infant daughter also survives.

BARNES, James E. Jr., 29, Com 40'38, son of Mr. and Mrs. James E. Barnes of Youngstown. An infantry officer with the 3rd Army, he died of wounds received in action in Belgium on Jan. 26, '45. He is survived by his widow, the former Bernice Patton, and an infant son, James E. IV. His father, James E. (Doc) Barnes, Sr., is a noted physical culturist and president of the Ohio State Boxing Commission. Mrs. Barnes is the former Nellie Daly Moran, stage comedienne.

BRODIE, Marvin W., Jr., 22, Engr av'44, son of Marvin W. Brodie of Columbus. Serving as midshipman on an ammunition ship of the Merchant Marine, he was reported missing on Dec. 2, '43, after an enemy bombing of his ship anchored at Bari, off southern Italy, and was officially declared dead a year later. He had been in the Merchant Marine since March, '43. His stepmother and one sister also survive. On campus he was a member of Sigma Chi fraternity.

BOWMAN, Lt. Leroy C., 27, Engr & 40, husband of the former Marjorie Billingsley and son of Mr. and Mrs. L. D. Bowman of Canton. An instructor in twin-engine planes at Altus, Okla, he was killed when his plane crashed on Feb. 10, '45. He had been an instructor at Altus since graduating from Ellington Field in Feb. '43. He was a graduate of Massillon High school and at the University, where he was ma-

joring in electrical engineering, he was a member of the Triangle fraternity. Two sisters and a brother also survive.

CROWL, Lt. Gordon S., 34, BA'35, MSc '37, son of Mrs. Olive Crowl of Marengo, O. An artillery officer who fought through Bataan and Corregidor and survived the "death march on Bataan," he lost his life when American torpedoes sank a Jap freighter on which American prisoners were being transferred to another camp on Sept. 7, '44. He was an instructor in the University's botany department, working on a doctorate degree, when called to active duty in November, '40. A native of Fulton, O., (see cut), he was a member of the pistol team and Phi Epsilon Phi fraternity which he served as treasurer and president as an undergraduate. Halso was elected to Sigma Xi, scientific honorary. His widow, the former Blythe Pearce, also survives.

DEHMER, Lt. Charles S., 28, Com w'39, husband of the former Janet Ann Ingham of Pittsburgh, and son of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Dehmer of Tiffin. He was killed on Dec. 9, '44, while piloting a P-47 on a bombing and strafing mission over northern Italy. He operated an insurance agency in Tiffin after leaving the University and at the time he entered the AAF, he was vice-president of a real estate firm in Pittsburgh. Two sisters also survive.

DENNIS, Lt. James W. (Jim), 28, BSc Com'37, son of Mrs. Harley J. Dennis of Ashley, O. He was killed in the crash of a four-engine bomber on March 8, '45, near the Courtland Army Air Field, Ala. Jim was one of the most popular and active young men to graduate from the University in recent years (see cut). He was president of the senior class in '37; president of Sphinx, Strollers, and the Ohio Union Board; business manager of the Makio in '36. He was president one year of his social fraternity, Delta Upsilon. He was a member of Bucket and Dipper, Romophos, Beta Gamma Sigma, Phi Eta Sigma and Pi Sigma Alpha. His friends on campus were legion. His death was the 405th reported to the War Records


the Marines including heavy action at Bougainville and Saipan. He was a football and basketball star at Smithfield, (O.) High School where he graduated. He was studying aeronautical engineering at Ohio State when he enlisted in the Marines in March, '43. (See cut.) The Bronze Star medal was awarded posthumously.



SCOTT, Capt. Don F., 23, Edu w'41, of North Canton, O. Killed in bomber crash in England, Oct. 1, '43. He had taken part in nine bombing missions over Europe (see cut). He was the University's most prominent athlete to give his life. On campus, he was a nine letter man—football, basketball and track—captained the '39 Conference championship eleven. He belonged to Phi Delta Theta fraternity, was elected to junior and senior men's honoraries. A son was born to Don's widow in a Columbus hospital, one week after his death. The University's flying field has been named Don Scott Field in honor of the pilot's memory.

Seeds, 0792751, as they have lost two sons in the service. The War Department has advised me regarding this matter this date as follows.

Inasmuch as this case falls within the category of the recently established War Department policy regarding the retention in the United States of the sole surviving son where two or more have been lost or killed, on 2 February 1945 the War Department directed the retention of this officer. Wr. and Mrs. Seeds were notified of this action on the same date. At that time there was no indication that it was desired to have Lieutenant Seeds relieved from active duty and such action cannot be taken on the basis of a request from this officer's parents. However, Lieutenant Seeds may be advised, if he so desires, to submit an application in accordance with Section II or III of Circular 485, War Department, 1944, for relief from active duty.





INCLUSION POLICY FOR KIA RECOGNITION Amended February 2013

I. Background

Establishing a definition of "Killed in Action (KIA)" and the necessary eligibility requirements to be included in the KIA memorial are critical to the overall thoroughness of the memorial.

After further review of multiple eligibility criteria for several different memorials, it is recommended that the City of Dublin adopts a definition for "Killed in Action (KIA)" while also establishing a set of criteria to be eligible for inclusion in the KIA memorial.

If the inclusion criterion is met, the individual has the opportunity to be buried on the grounds of the KIA memorial on a first come, first serve basis. The burial spots are in the form of 3 vacant grave sites along with the ability to bury cremains under the basalt pavers in the plaza area of the memorial.

II. Definition

Killed in Action (KIA) can be defined as a casualty classification generally used by militaries to describe the deaths of their own forces at the hands of hostile forces. The United States Department of Defense says that those declared KIA need not have fired their weapons, but have been killed due to hostile attack.

III. Inclusion Criteria

In order for a Nominee to be included in the KIA Memorial, the Nominee must meet <u>all</u> the following criteria:

- A.) Killed in Action (KIA) as determined by the military. A certified Report of Incident, which is issued for all KIA by the military, must be submitted. If a certified Report of Incident is not available, then other records listed below may be considered.
 - a. Telegram/letter
 - b. Newspaper article
 - c. Death Certificate
 - d. History Book
 - e. Obituary from newspaper, Internet
 - f. Department of Defense data
 - g. Internet or print records from museums, libraries, military, church organizations (Such as the National Personnel Records Center and the Department of Defense).
- B.) Died during a period of action/invasion/conflict. This includes the following, but is not limited to: World War I, World War II, Korea, Vietnam, Desert Storm, Enduring Freedom, Desert Shield, Somalia, Granada, Operation Just Cause, and Operation Iraqi Freedom. Friendly fire is recognized as KIA.

C.) A certified Home of Record, birth certificate or proof of residence must list Dublin, Ohio. This includes the community of Washington Township and the former Village of Dublin, Ohio. Exception may be made if the Nominee attended Dublin City Schools.

Proof of Dublin Residency

A copy of at least one of the following is required to prove that the Nominee lived in Dublin.

- a. Birth Certificate
- b. Newspaper of Birth Announcement
- c. Hospital Records
- d. Ohio Drivers License
- e. Certified Home of Record/enlistment paperwork
- f. Dublin private or public school records/identification
- g. City records
- h. School yearbooks, etc.

IV. Nomination Process

Nominations for inclusion may be submitted to Dublin City Council through the City Clerk's Office. City Council will consider requests for inclusion at any time. Names of individuals approved for inclusion in the memorial will be engraved approximately 30 days prior to Memorial Day and 30 days prior to Veterans Day.

V. Determination of Dublin City Council

If the eligibility criteria are not met, Dublin City Council may, in its sole judgment, select to add additional individual names to the memorial. Additionally, individuals not meeting the criteria are eligible for memorial stones at the *Grounds of Remembrance*.
